RENEWABLE ENERGY PURCHASES

In 2023, the Socorro Electric Cooperative purchased 801,474 kWh of renewable energy. The New Mexico Public Regulation Commission Rule NMSA 62-15-34 (D) requires the cooperative to report to the Membership annually on renewable energy purchased on behalf of our Members. Renewable Energy means electric energy generated by means of a low or zero emissions generation technology with substantial long-term production potential and generated by use of renewable energy resources that may include solar, wind, or hydropower resources.
